SYLLABUS FOR RESEARCH APTITUDE TEST IN NURSING

The syllabus for Research Aptitude Test (RAT) in Nursing is divided in two parts viz. Part A and Part B as described below:

PART – A

Part A of the RAT shall be designed to assess the research skills/aptitude of the candidate consisting of questions from the following areas:

- **1. Research Methodology:** meaning, characteristics, and ethical issues in research; types of research; research methods.
- **2. Logical Reasoning:** arguments, deductive and inductive research; logical and Venn diagram; inferences; analogies.
- **3. Data Interpretation:** interpretation of data; mapping and analysis of data, tools for data analysis; quantitative and qualitative research.
- 4. General Awareness about Basic Science: basic science up to the level of SSC.
- **5. Mathematical Reasoning:** number series, letter series, codes; relationships, classification.

PART – B

Part-B of RAT is designed to assess the subject specific knowledge of the candidate covering the syllabus given as below:

Nursing Education: Introduction, principles, concepts, trends, and issues related to nursing education.

Nursing Administration: Philosophy, purpose, elements, principles and scope of administration, planning, organisation, human resource for health, directing, material management, controlling, fiscal planning, nursing informatics.

Advance Nursing Practice: Nursing as a profession, health care delivery, genetics, epidemiology, bio-psycho social pathology, nursing process approach, psychological aspects and human relation, nursing practice, computer applications for patient care delivery system and nursing practice

Nursing Theories: Introduction, importance, characteristics, basic processes in the development of nursing theories; philosophy and theories of nursing- general system theory, adaptation theory, developmental theory; common concepts in nursing theories, historical perspectives; nursing philosophies — Florence nightingale's legacy of caring,

Ernestine Wiedenbach: the helping art of clinical nursing, Virginia Henderson's definition of nursing, Faye G. Abedellah's typology of twenty one nursing problems, Jean Watson's philosophy and science of caring, Patricia Benner's primacy of caring.

General knowledge relating to nursing profession.
